In preparation of report RPT-0177-24 County Staff undertook environmental scans of other municipal approaches to regulation of chickens in residential areas.

Table 1.2 provides a detailed overview of other municipal approaches in municipalities reviewed. County Staff acknowledges this list is not exhaustive.
